ABERNETHY AND DISTRICT COMMUNITY COUNCIL

With a month between preparation of the Community Council update and publication in the Crier, intervening events have a habit of contradicting the status of key topics currently under discussion or consideration at the community council so this update is set against that backdrop:

Village parking proposals - after an encouraging start, progress has ground to a halt in that five months after the initial meeting we still await PKC's proposals for the possible introduction of hatching in three small areas of the Square that is designed to ensure free passage and movement of vehicles and reduce the likelihood of inappropriate or inconsiderate parking. After repeated requests for update, we have triggered the complaints process with PKC in an effort to elicit speedy production of the proposal, after that PKC will present their ideas either at a future community council meeting or an on site meeting.

Main Issues Report - for anyone not familiar with the terminology this is PKC's five year plan that sets out broad development proposals for the region. Our interest in this is acute in that several areas around Abernethy and Aberargie have been suggested for future and significant development. PKC have given no firm date for issue but on publication of the consultation document we will devote the following community council meeting to discussion of the proposals and development of a community response. Once we have that date we will post an update on the village website, Facebook and the notice boards.

Binn Wind Farm – through our participation in the Binn Wind Farm Community Liaison Group we know discussions regarding routing of an underground cable from the wind farm site to the Abernethy Sub-station are still ongoing, given the topography and bed rock depth this will be a tricky and costly undertaking but far preferable to unsightly over ground cabling and the associated poles. At the last Liaison Group meeting the community council signed a pre-agreement that sets out the general terms of reference for the future establishment of a community benefit fund that will accrue during the lifetime of the wind farm.



And finally but most importantly: those familiar with the Community Council election outcome will know there have been a number of changes recently but none so significant as the retirement of Ann Sangster as Abernethy Community Council Secretary after twenty-five years service with an unrivalled 100% attendance record. During that time Ann has seen off many a community council chairman, been the scourge of petty bureaucrats, bane to those blighting the lives of others and a fount of knowledge for anyone looking to navigate the seemingly impenetrable layers of local authority legislation and process. Never one to avoid controversy or confrontation in trying to effect the most appropriate outcome for the community, Ann's heart has always been in the right place and the community council will be the poorer through her retirement. That said and with Ann now at the other side of the table, we expect to be regularly brought to task through Ann's robust challenge of future community council business.

NURSE PEATTIE MEMORIAL GARDEN

Have you noticed the changes at Nurse Peattie's garden?

The latest have been the removal of the big fir at the fence on the roundabout side of the garden and the rebuilding of the wall which was in front of it. The fir tree spoiled the look of the gardens when entering the village from Perth and overshadowed and restricted growth in parts of the garden.





Many of us do not realise how much effort is put in by Abernethy in Bloom - a select band of navvies, all volunteers - to maintaining the garden.

At the time this work was being planned for the garden the Community Council were looking for somewhere to site a second Christmas tree as the one at the school was not seen by those entering the village from the West. What could be better than this new space created right at Perth Road, Back Dykes and Main Street junction? When the fir tree was removed there would be an opportunity to get the council to put in a socket for a reasonable sized tree and to provide a power source for the tree lights. After all there was a lamppost very conveniently sited at the fence.



When the tree was removed the council were approached and agreed to do the work *but at a price* - and **what a price**! To have this work done someone will have to pay £1800 and neither the volunteer gardeners nor the Community Council have that sort of money.

It is the ideal site for the Christmas tree and it would bring a bit of seasonal cheer to the village, maybe the charity carol singers who perform in the streets of Abernethy every Christmas would give a carol concert under the tree.

But none of this can happen unless the money can be found to pay for it. If each household receiving the Crier contributed £2.50 to the cause this would pay for the work and for the new tree lights necessary since the ones purchased last year were damaged by person or persons unknown.

Any contribution, the bigger the better but still acceptable however small, will be gratefully accepted and can be placed in the boxes provided at Berryfields and Brian Greig's shop. We are all very grateful to both of these enterprises for making the facility available. Donations will also be accepted through the letter boxes at the addresses below. I was born in 1942 so most of my childhood was spent with rationing. There was only one kind of National margarine, National bread, no cream and very little butter. Everyone was the same and this was completely normal to us.

We still had our treats.

My mother would take us shopping in Lewis's Department Store which had a Soda Fountain in the basement. My sister and I were thrilled to get a sixpenny ice-cream in a dish. This would be 21/2p in today's money.

The pinnacle of the menu was a Knickerbocker Glory. This was in a tall sundae glass with ice-cream, red jelly, tinned fruit and topped with a whirl of synthetic cream. This sumptuous creation cost a whopping Two Shillings and Sixpence (121/2p) and was clearly so far beyond our wildest dreams that we didn't even ask for one.

It is very sad that, now I am in my seventies, even as a pensioner, I could afford a Knickerbocker Glory. But I don't want one. It sounds revolting.

The Moral.

Perhaps a dream is better than the reality. But I do feel that if a child yearns for something, and you can afford it, it is nice to fulfil their dream.

Childhood passes and adults learn the hard way that you cannot always have what you want. But it is very nice to have treats to sweeten the hard facts of life.

After a couple of hours (and walking round Perth dressed as a Victorian assassin) we were told that we only had one scene left but that had to be at night (as it was a killing scene).

So we sat around and waited, and waited, and waited. By about 11 we started filming. And by 12 we were leaving.

I was called back on a few other occasions. Some were fun like filming in Perth Academy and shooting blow darts at victims. Some were not as fun like more alleyway scenes resulting in 30 takes.

But it is fair to say that the experience was wonderful. Having to make laughing and crying sounds in the microphone for the sound crew. Having fun with the directors and the actors also in the film. All together I had a ball.

And when it came to the big film premier on the IM-AX screen at Perth. wearing suits, fancy dresses, and as many chains as you can fit round your neck, I was thrilled watching myself on the big screen.

After this experience I had a lot more respect for actors in big movies complaining that they work so hard. Because now I realise that they probably do. This is my experience of being a child actor and despite all the work I had a great time and I hope that there will be more films for me to do in the future.

Hilda Clow's mention of the dancing scene in Perth in her foreword to the last issue brought memories flooding back of happy nights at the 'Sally' and the City Hall. Monday night was Big band night at the City Hall when the likes of Joe Loss, Sid Phillips, Teddy Foster and Johnny Dankworth played, to name but a few. The norm was three tunes and then change partners but Ken Mackintosh was the exception to the rule and seemed to play on forever. I used to maintain that if you asked a girl up to dance you could end up going steady.

Then there was the traditional jazz bands such as Chris Barber and Mick Mulligan with George Melly on vocals. Who can forget his rendition of 'Frankie and Johnny' with George ending up flat on his back when the gun went 'rootatoottoot'.

Resident band was the New Cavendish Orchestra under the leadership of Ronnie Spiers on trumpet. Ronnie worked in Paterson's music shop in South Methven Street where I was a regular customer in search of the latest records by the likes of Duke Ellington and Harry James. Sadly Ronnie passed away last year at the age of 93. Largs in County Place was another source of records which reminds me of an amusing incident when I went to collect a record which I had ordered. It was the Peggy Lee recording of "Mr Wonderful". The girl assistant looked at me enquiringly and said "Mr?". With my mind firmly focused on the record I had ordered I instinctively replied "Wonderful". She must have thought this guy really fancies himself.

Harry Ogilvie's Orchestra was the resident band at the Salutation Hotel on Saturday nights. As the only set of wheels available to me in those days was a bicycle I was slightly disadvantaged when it came to pulling the birds compared to the young farmers dangling their car keys. "Dae ye fancy a bar hame" is not the ideal chat up line. Despite that, I did try which led to an embarrassing situation when it transpired that the lady in question was on a hen night with her pals and was due to be married the following Saturday. The lesson I learned was always check the left hand. Getting home was another problem as the

last bus for Stanley left at 10.45. Hitch-hiking was often successful but one evening we persuaded a friend to run us home if we paid for the petrol. He owned an ancient Daimler saloon which was built like a tank. There were five of us in the car plus the driver and his girlfriend. Negotiating a double bend iust short of Stanley the car hit black ice and ended up on its side in a field. I was trapped in the front passenger seat below the driver and his girl friend with the others in a heap in the back. Getting out was a problem as the doors weighed a ton but we all crawled out relatively unscathed. Just then two passing cars stopped to give assistance. The occupants must have been to a ball as the men wore kilts and the ladies long dresses with tartan sashes. Our reaction Good Lord, its the White Heather Club! They transported our obliging friend and his girl back to Perth while we walked home to Stanley. My Mother never knew that I had been in an accident.
