BAIGLIE STRAIGHT CYCLE FOOTPATH



Further to my article in the Crier earlier this year, I have been in contact with Ms Robinson, Principal Engineer (Traffic and Road Safety) as well as Mrs Elizabeth Smith, MSP who is in support of the notion of such a path along the Baiglie straight.

Two responses from Ms Robinson were of particular interest. The first dated 2nd September reads as follows

1. It is noted that you consider that a path would be beneficial for pedestrians and cyclists. I agree but only made reference to cyclists as a cycle path was mentioned in the original enquiry from Elizabeth Smith MSP.

2. The footpath you refer to on Edinburgh Road from Craiglowan School to Gleneagles is a cycle path and is a continuation of the path from Bridge of Earn. This project was also combined with an accident remedial scheme. As such it was partly funded from our Road Safety Budget. The footpath you refer to on Gleneagles Road again is a cycle path and was funded by Sustrans, the Council and the Scottish Government. This project forms part of the "Around Perth Cycle Route".

3. As advised the route in question was due to be assessed as part of our new rural footway programme but unfortunately this budget is not longer available. You are correct in that all requests had to be assessed against certain criteria. This included assessment based on accidents, usage, links to Council policy, access to community facilities and Safer Routes to School. I'm afraid I cannot comment on the information you received previously.

In terms funding, as you appreciate resources are limited (particularly this year and for the coming vears), and it is therefore very important that we carefully consider our priorities. In terms of Traffic & Road Safety my resources are focussed on accident reduction and prevention, the provision of essential traffic signing and road markings (e.g. warning signs, regulatory signs), Safer Routes to Schools, and the implementation of measures to introduce necessary restrictions. Any other schemes, such as new cycle paths, tend to be funded from external sources such as the Scottish Government and Sustrans (who also have access to Government funding).

With regard to Maintenance, decisions are based on need. Each area supervisor is asked to put forward locations that they deem require a maintenance treatment (on the basis of their inspection regime) be it patching, resurfacing, surface dressing etc. For carriageways we compare against SRMCS (Scottish Road Maintenance Condition Survey) information to establish it is consistent with the overall criteria set down country wide for maintenance interventions but we have no such comparator for footways and so it is assessed on the basis of overall need. This then compares footways across the entire area against each other. We also have a duty to maintain what is there, so even if there is a good footway on one side and deteriorated one on the other, we have a duty under Road (Scotland) Act 1984 to repair it. No such duty exists to provide new. The funding mechanism is also different in that maintenance are not creating another asset but having to maintain the existing ones with a reduced budget.

I advise that the works being carried out on Edinburgh Road are footway works. At that location the footway was in poor condition - it had potholes below our intervention levels.

I hope you find the forgoing helpful.

Following further enquiry, I received this communication from Ms Robinson on 21st September

Dear Mr Brownsmith.

Sustrans receive funding from the Scottish Government which they make available to local Councils. Attached are details of the funding made available this year through their community links programme. Please note however that match funding must be provided. We made 8 applications this year but have only been able to progress 3. All of them are small schemes because of the match funding element. I think Sustrans also provide funding to community groups who make applications but I'm not sure if this would including funding for physical measures such as paths.

With regard to the Government Grant Funding for Cycling, Walking and Safer Streets as far as I am aware we have no commitment from the Government that this funding will be extended beyond March 2012.

in one of my previous emails I indicated what kind of schemes we must consider as a priority.

As advised the Baiglie Straight is around 3km long so it would be quite costly to put a cycle path along the length of it. Costs are estimated at around £300,000, excluding traffic management and welfare. For a scheme of this size we would need to provide match funding of half. In the current financial climate we would be unable to do so.

WIPE OUT YOUR DEBTS! NO WIN NO FEE!

A gentleman came into the CAB with a pile of paperwork and a sorry story.

He was up to date with all his bills and rent but he did have two credit cards. One had $\pounds1500$ on it, the other $\pounds2500$ and he had been gradually whittling this balance down.

He received a phone call saying that he may be able to wipe out these debts completely due to a technicality in the terms and conditions. He thought it seemed a bit unlikely but when the caller said we will act for you on a 'No win, no fee' basis he thought, 'What have I got to lose?' and gave details of both his cards.

Instantly £790 was debited from one of them. When he queried this he was told he would get the money back when his case was successful.

This happened a year ago. His phone calls to the company were met with the assurance that the case would be going to court soon.

Then the company went into liquidation.

All seemed lost when he had a phone call from another company saying that they had got his details and they would pursue the case for him. However they needed £149 from him for administration otherwise the case would not go to court.

He wanted to know if he should send this money. When I said, 'No.' he was quite upset because he thought it was his only chance of getting something for his $\pounds790$.

I was sorry to have to tell him that this money was well and truly gone. If he paid the latest demand he would be asked for more later on. He was better putting the money towards paying off his card the normal way.

Telephone callers can be very persuasive but if it sounds too good to be true it usually is.

A RECIPE FOR THE SEASON

Twice Baked Cheese Soufflés with a Creamy Leek Sauce

300ml of milk (which has previously been heated and then infused with a bay leaf, onion and peppercorns, optional)

50g of butter

50g of flour

Pinch of dried mustard powder or 1 tsp of Dijon

150g of good strong cheddar, grated 4 egg and 1 extra white Salt and pepper



For the sauce

2-4 leeks, depends on the size!300ml of double cream25g of butter100g of freshly grated parmesan cheeseNutmeg

Preheat the oven to 180°C/Gas mark 4

Melt the butter and add the flour. Cook until sandy in colour, about 2-3 mins. Slowly add milk a little at a time to form a smooth white sauce. Stirring constantly and bring to the boil. Add the cheese (off the heat) and melt into the sauce. Add the mustard powder or mustard and season if needed.

Separate the eggs. Add the egg yolks to the sauce. In a separate bowl, whisk the egg whites until stiff, but not too dry. Fold very carefully into the cheese mixture. Spoon into ramekins.

Stand in a bain-marie and bake for 15mins. Bring out of the oven and leave to cool in the ramekins.

Wash and chop the leeks and soften over a low heat in the butter. This may take about 5-10 mins. Do not allow to burn, but you want soft leeks, nothing worse than squeaky leeks! Pour in the cream, grated nutmeg and season. Bring to the boil and take off the heat. Don't allow to reduce too much. If you make this in advance and it has gone too thick, add a splash of warm water from the kettle to thin it down a bit.

Preheat the oven to 180°C/Gas mark 4

Meanwhile, run a knife around the soufflés and turn out on to an ovenproof dish. Pour over the soufflés and sprinkle with parmesan. Bake for 10 -15mins, until browning on the top and hot in the middle. Serve immediately.

Some of you may never have considered it before, but we live in one of best places in the world for Mountain Biking, thanks to some enlightened Scottish Access Laws and the endless network of trails that criss-cross our beautiful country.

Mountain biking is both exciting to watch and take part in. It appeals to all ages and promotes physical activity and general well being, getting people out into the fresh air and away from TVs and games consoles. This surely has to be encouraged in a country where obesity is a huge problem to both children and adults alike. And if it's raining (it does occasionally in Scotland) who cares? Mud just adds to the fun!

Pitmedden Forest on the outskirts of Abernethy is not only the perfect place to take the dog and the kids for a walk, but it's also a gem when it comes to Mountain Biking. This fantastic place is at our disposal whenever we feel the need to burn off some steam/calories and get a quick shot of adrenaline at the same time. I love Mountain Biking in Pitmedden Forest for lots of different reasons. I love the smell of the Pine trees as I jink through them, hopping over their roots looking as far ahead as possible for the best line down the trail. I love the way two rides are never the same no matter how many times I have ridden there, the way the forest changes through the seasons, and the sound of the trees creaking on a windy day when I stop for a breather. Most of all though, I love the fact I can get on my bike in the village and within minutes I'm riding through the forest with the good friends that I have met whilst riding there.

Although this is such a beautiful part of the country surrounded by fantastic riding, most bikers who visit Scotland to go Mountain Biking will head for The Cairngorms, Laggan-Wolftrax, Nevis Range or The

7stanes Trail Centres in The Borders. This is with good reason, all of these places are fantastic, but why not host a mountain bike event on our local trails within travelling distance of all of them and let them see what they're missing out on? Pitmedden Forest has no waymarking, so it is easy to get lost there, and this can be off putting for some riders who don't want to waste their riding time lost. looking for a decent trail to ride. This is the reason a lot of riders either stick to the places they know or hit the trail centres. They know they can just follow a well marked course and concentrate solely on enjoying the ride. I think an event incorporating a huge lap of Pitmedden Forest is a great way to give riders an unguided tour of the trails we locals love to ride.

There is already a proposed plan for the Powrie Park which includes repositioning the play area, to avoid the flooding problem currently experienced, and purchasing better play equipment. Future plans include a bike skills loop and possibly a skate park.

Abernethy Playgroup is a self-funded playgroup and we desperately need to recruit more children to avoid closure. Due to a number of children graduating to nursery and primary school our numbers have dropped and we now find ourselves in a position where we are in danger of closing and have found ourselves looking to recruit from outwith the village. Our Playgroup exposes the children to early socialisation and helps shy children to come out of their shells. Farm Security

Over the past few weeks there have been a number of thefts from rural farm properties in the Bridge of Earn and Kinross-shire areas.



Farm and plant machinery is very attractive to thieves due to its high value and is routinely reported stolen from farms, building sites and other rural locations. Where possible such machinery should be kept out of view and locked away when not in use. Consideration should also be given to property marking and ensure that all keys are kept in a separate location.

Vehicles such as quad bikes, motor bikes and other 4x4 vehicles are also often subject to thefts. It is advisable to keep such vehicles locked away when not in use. These vehicles should be kept close to occupied farm buildings where practical.

The majority of tools used on farms can easily be lifted and placed within a vehicle, and may not be missed for some time after a crime has taken place. All tools should be property marked, not left lying about and it is also advisable to keep an inventory of tools which can be used for insurance purposes.

Fuel tanks are another regular target for thieves and must be kept locked, especially where located in remote position.

Annual After Dark Campaign

During mid-October there were a series of break-ins in the Bridge of Earn and Newburgh areas. With this in mind we are once again appealing to members of the public to heed the home security and crime prevention advice given as part of our annual After Dark Campaign.

As winter sets in residents are being warned that criminals start to capitalise on the shorter days. With the prolonged hours of darkness, comes the increased activity of opportunist thieves. After Dark is aimed at promoting home security and allowing people to feel safe in their own homes during the long winter nights.

Traditionally, the number of break-ins goes up during the darker nights and we are hoping homeowners will take every step possible to reduce their chances of becoming victims of crime, by following the crime prevention steps promoted through Operation After Dark. Over the last few weeks officers will have been carrying out high profile foot and mobile patrols in all parts of Tayside, aimed at preventing the number of house break-ins, and After Dark information cards will be available with advice on simple safety measures to try and combat the criminals.

Top After Dark crime prevention tips include:

- Lock ALL doors, windows, gates, sheds, garages and other outbuildings.
- Put away garden tools and ladders.
- Install an intruder alarm AND REMEMBER TO USE IT.
- Set blinds and curtains to deter "window shopping" this includes sheds as well.
- Mark valuables with your postcode and house number.
- Out timers for internal lights if you are out in the evenings.
- Fit or check external security lights.
- Finally, be a good neighbour. If you see something suspicious, contact the police immediately!

Neighbourhood Watch

Neighbourhood Watch (NW) is a community led initiative to bring groups of local people together to address local crime and other community issues. Successful Neighbourhood Watch requires a close liaison between households in a neighbourhood, the local police and the local authority.

Neighbourhood Watches can be large, covering most of the households on an estate, or they might involve just a few houses. They may meet frequently, or only keep in touch via e-mail. There really is no 'One size fits all' approach to Neighbourhood Watch.

THE CAMPAIGN TO REOPEN NEWBURGH TRAIN STATION

Newburgh Train Station Campaign launched itself during the summer of 2011 with a base of strong local support and a case well researched.

Newburgh with 2000 residents is the largest town in Fife next to a railway line with no station of its own and is entirely dependent on road transport. With rising oil prices and carbon emissions a rail station makes sense. Strong local support is emerging from the town and the surrounding area.

In the last ten years the Edinburgh-Perth train service has more than doubled. Local population increases in nearby Abernethy and new housing planned for Newburgh means even more people are likely to want to catch the train to Edinburgh and Perth.

Recent Scottish station re-openings in Laurencekirk and Beauly have been very successful with passenger numbers far exceeding expectations.

Given that a train service is already up and running, a Newburgh station could be viably operated and maintained, almost certainly improving railway finances rather than requiring an extra subsidy.

TransportScotland the Scottish Government agency responsible for transport policy presumes against new intermediate stations unless these are strategic in nature because of a claimed impact on journey times between major urban areas. This is a hurdle but not insurmountable as the case of Laurencekirk especially shows.

Representations to the TayPlan have been made with all local MSPs adding their support on a cross-party basis to urge that a high strategic priority is given on the plan to reopening the train station at Newburgh.



Also a motion (S4M-00538) has been lodged in the Scottish Parliament calling for the re-establishment of a rail halt at Newburgh (see http://www.scottish.parliament.uk/). 22 MSPs have signed up to this motion so far but the campiaign would like to see all the local MSPs who wrote to the TayPlan adding their support to this motion as well.

The Newburgh Train Station Campaign sent three of its campaign group members to attend a meeting of Abernethy Community Council in July to inform them of the fact that there was now a campaign underway to reopen the station at Newburgh. The news of this was received well by the community council who recognised that a station at Newburgh would be beneficial for people in Abernethy, especially on journeys to Edinburgh.

With this in mind, the Newburgh Train Station Campaign would like to invite anyone who resides in Abernethy and would like to see the station at Newburgh reopen to get involved in any way they can.

The campaign needs people as individuals to write to or email as many local councillors, MSPs and MPs, asking them to support and publicly endorse the reopening of the train station at Newburgh and to persuade the Scottish Government and Transport-Scotland of the merits and deep rooted public interest in this. Help in fund raising is also needed.

The Mobile is a 45ft, 14-ton expanding 'classroom' divided into six activity zones – aeroplane, spaceship, music, museum, library and quiz zone, each one helping to bring the Bible and its message to life in an exciting way. One boy said at the end of the 70 minutes, "Some of my mates said we would just be sitting listening but this is awesome. I can't believe what it's like; all the things there are to do!" 89 Pupils from Abernethy Primary School attended.


