In the June edition reference was made to grass verges not being cut properly. It's worth pointing out that the council have for some years been cutting the grass only as far as is necessary for visibility leaving the remainder of the verge to grow naturally. VICTORIAN JUBILEES IN ABERNETHY

Earlier this year Oueen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee

was celebrated, and it was obvious that she is still

hugely admired, loved and respected by the vast majority of the UK population. Such was also the case in 1897 regarding her great-great grandmother, Oueen Victoria, at the time of her Diamond Jubilee. However the manner in which these two events were celebrated locally stand in stark contrast. While many may have watched with pleasure, pride and interest the key events of our Queen's jubilee on TV, there was little by way of active local celebration. This contrasts with the 1897 celebration for Oueen Victoria, as reported in the PA on 23/6/1897:-"Abernethy loyally blossomed into a handsome display of bunting, many private houses decorating in a style quite surpassing any public reioicing. The first event was a joint thanksgiving service at 11.30 in the Parish church, conducted by all three ministers, viz-Rev. Messrs Stevenson, Cairns and Butler. Following this service, at one o'clock a dinner was served for the aged and deserving in the Williamson Hall. Some 93 invitations were served, but only 28 had accepted the invitation to be present, the remainder of the vast majority stating that they were unable to attend; but the committee at their meeting on Monday evening decided that those who were unable to attend were to have their share sent to them after the celebrations were over. Following the dinner came the treat to the children at 3 o'clock. The children met at the Public School at 2.30, and, being all marshaled in order by their respective teachers, a march was made through the streets of the village,

headed by the Marr and McNaughton Instrumental Band and two Highland pipers, the children all joining in the Queen's Anthem, to the Williamson Hall, followed by a big crowd of the general public. Owing to the damp and wet, tea was served in the hall. A large staff of lady waiters attended to the wants of the young people. Both old and young had an ample supply. After the inner man was supplied a march was made to the park, where games were gone through."

Ten years earlier Victoria's Golden Jubilee had been celebrated in a very similar manner. A Perthshire Courier article (28/6/1887) gives details of this event. It mentions that "the new flag lately presented to the Town Council by Lord Home, The Superior, with the family crest, was hung from the window of the Council-room, while the Union Jack floated from the flagstaff on the old tower." Again the scholars marched round the town, headed this time by the Auchtermuchty Brass Band. The Town Council also joined the procession. Again games and sports were "got up for the young" in a park lent by Mr Davidson, Gattaway. Later there was dancing, which was "gone into with great zest." At 10 o'clock a magnificent display of fireworks took place.

In the afternoon a congratulatory telegram had been sent to Lord Home, to be presented to Her Majesty in the name of the Town Council and the general community. Can we assume that, in like manner, the Community Council of this ancient Pictish capital sent QE2 a loyal e mail, text, or even a tweet?

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Gap Year

"Gap year" When people hear these two words they can quite often imagine some lazy teenagers

going on holiday to "find themselves", but that is nothing like what I have decided to do in my year out. My gap year is something a bit different and pretty strange for a young teenager who is used to having a phone in her hand all the time. I have been selected by a charitable trust called Project Trust to go out to the Ugandan Children Sure House in Kiwalanga. There I will live with two girls, whom I will meet when I am at training, in a small simplistic house with a bedroom for us to share and a living area where we will cook and spend time relaxing (as if!). Something I am least looking forward to is having a bucket of water for my shower every day, although it may cool me down! Project Trust is a charity that has been sending school leavers out to countries in South America, Asia and Africa for the past 45 years. They offer many different adventures for the 17 - 19 year olds, such as an outwards bound experience where you take part in loads of different activities but also teach them to those in the country you are assigned. You can also be offered a place in a school teaching or in an orphanage, just being there to help others. Once I was selected by Project Trust I was told I had to raise £5100 to pay for my voluntary year abroad. This would cover the costs of my insurance while over there as well as my flights and accommodation. I managed this by holding a small concert for family and close friends with a friend singing which raised £300 and a golf day at Blairgowrie Golf Club. My day at Blairgowrie managed to raise me a whopping £4000, which was a huge shock. However I still needed to raise more money, so to do this I wrote to many different trusts. Not every trust could donate anything to me, and many did not even get back to me at all, but those that did helped me raise another £1500 meaning I had managed to raise all of my money, plus more for any other volunteer that found their fundraising a little more difficult. What Project Trust didn't tell me, was that the £5100 I raised will not cover the cost of my injections which have come to a whopping total of £500, so now I am looking for a way to try and raise this money as I feel this year should not be funded by mum and dad as it is my challenge and I wish to achieve it by myself.

Loads of people have asked me if I am excited about my year in Uganda, and as much as I would love to say yes and sound like a big brave girl, I know in myself I am petrified. I am scared of the thought I am going to be away from all my friends and family for a year and even worse...my phone! It will be a huge shock for me to live in such a different culture where my phone isn't a necessity and my family aren't there to help me when I get scared. I am looking forward to the experiences I am going to face and all of the new people I am going to meet. I am looking forward to growing up and living independently, but mostly I am looking forward to helping those that have so much less than me and having the feeling in myself that I have made a little bit of difference.

Dear All.

I will be up front and honest - this is a charity appeal. Over that last few years, but particularly during the operation in Afghanistan. I have been shocked by the devastating effect of Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) (road side bombs) on the lives of many young soldiers. The damage IEDs cause to the body and minds of our young soldiers is indescribable. I am in awe of those who continue to operate in Afghanistan knowing that the threat from IEDs is high and the chance of losing life or limb at the hands of terrorist IEDs is ever present. I look to repay some of their bravery and selfless commitment by supporting BLES-MA, the British Limbless Ex-Servicemen's Association. They provide support to those who are living through the nightmare of rebuilding their lives after the loss of limbs on the battlefield. The charity is with them for the rest of their lives. It starts with rehabilitation and is then about life long welfare support, campaigning for what they deserve and being there when old injuries resurface. The youngest member is 19 and the oldest is 99.

I have set myself the challenge of running 2012 miles in year 2012 to raise a minimum of (hopefully a lot more than) £2012 for BLESMA. 2012 miles works out as an average of 5.5 miles a day, every day of the year, or 38.5 miles in every week, or 77 marathons during the year, or running from where I work in London to where I grew up in Abernethy, Perthshire and back 2.5 times. If you think it sounds easy then set yourself the challenge of running 168 miles in a calendar month or even just 38.5 miles in a week and see how you get on. If I was a professional endurance runner, 2012 miles would still be a stretch target for annual mileage, but I'm not. In fact, if honest, I'm slightly out of shape and haven't committed to running training properly for at least a decade. Doing the miles on any individual day is not the challenge, doing them every day and staying injury free is.

With nearly 6 months now complete I have run **950** miles, logging **65,000** feet in elevation gain and using up over **90,000** calories in the process. I've lost about **6%** of my original body weight and my knees are getting sore, but I'm well on track to complete the challenge. Including off line donations, I have raised in excess of £2500, but given it is only June, I hope to raise a lot more in the remainder of the year.

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FAMILY MEMORIES

Donald Gordon MacKenzie, born 1937 at Perth City Hospital. I spent the war years staying with my grand-parents, Moses Struthers Forsyth and Margaret Semple Forsyth at Glenbank, Glenfoot, Abernethy, along with my mother (Charlotte) and following on sisters, Kathleen(1939) Sheila (1941) and Elizabeth (1944) whilst my father Mark Gordon Mackenzie served in The Black Watch for the duration of the war.

I have very few memories of the war years at Glenfoot, I can remember being sent down the 'short cut' to meet this strange man, dressed in trews, who had just got off the bus - my father" !! I recall standing outside the headmaster,s study (Mr Ironside) at Abernethy school waiting to get the tawse, I know not my crime. I was in a state of terror as his strap was rumoured to have metal studs in it! Luckily for me his wife came by and sent me back to the classroom. Later in life I wondered if that was the plan all along.

I have a photograph, circa 1940 of papa, as I called my grand-dad, myself and Mrs. Strachan from across the road, she was dressed in military officers uniform.

My auntie Joey Forsyth, who was my mother's nonidentical twin, was also in the army for some time during the war. Aunt Jean

Forsyth was a district nurse, both were based at Glenbank.

After the war the Mackenzie family moved to Ladybank and then Cupar but Glenbank remained a steady part of my life as we visited almost every second Sunday till the mid 50s. I can recall if the weather was fine then everyone would walk up to the witches cave till my grandparents were no longer able.

My grandfather must have been one of the first people to have electricity in Glenfoot as he had his own generator which was started up on regular basis to charge up the rows of glass battery cells that were lined up in the same shed as the generator. I can recall being fascinated by the whole process of creating and storing one's own power.



In the 1940's I have memories of papa delivering eggs and vegetables to PC Cant at the white house with the blue police lamp outside, it was always a good idea to keep on the right side of the law even in those days. Papa very occasionally went on a bender and these visits to the police house were no doubt to ensure an uninterrupted journey home, no breathalyzer in those days, not many cars either.

Papa had an Austin 16 which he managed to put on the lawn at the front of the house, he had been out shall we say !! ! If you look at Glenbank you will understand it was a wonder the car did not roll over down to the roadside hedge !! The grass carried the scorching by spilt petrol for some time. After that he kept the car in the Strachans garage so cutting out any further risk.

Still on motoring, I can recall, with petrol rationing still in force, Papa switching off the engine and trying to free-wheel all the way down to the Auchtermuchty road, he never quite made it but it was good fun trying. I must also mention whilst writing about cars that in the earty 50s I was in a Humber Hawk that my cousin was driving when I went over a 100 mph for the first time, it was down the Baiglie straight, no 70 mph limit in those days!!

In the early 50s as I got older I used to get paid 10 shillings (50p) a lot of money in those days for cutting all the grass and later still when I staved at Glenbank during holidays getting considerably more for cutting the hedges. Papa had one of the first electric hedge trimmers, his grandson (me) did in the initial usage, cut through the electric cable several times causing much sparking - and tellings off. The mid/late 50s I was in the RAF so was seldom at Glenbank. My grandfather at some time during that period tried to buy the small-holding next door belonging to a Mr Neill, he was one-armed but worked the land very efficiently. This small holding was to be my start on the farming ladder (papa had farmed at Newton of Collesie until the mid 1930s) Mr. Neill however decided not to sell. I had my 21st. birthday celebration with a meal at the Abernethy Hotel and a visit to my grandparents at Glenbank before proceeding to Perth theatre.

The deaths of my grand parents and selling of Glenbank in the early 1960s saw my connections with Abernethy limited to Pitversie House which was owned by my aunt Connie (Dow), it was run as orphanage/shelter for young girls. Aunt Connie adopted two of the girls and they were to become, at different stages in my life good friends. My sisters occasionally helped out at Pitversie House during holidays.

Also sticking in my mind as happening around that time was having a 'naked' picnic with a girl friend close to the witches cave and the mad panic that set in when we heard voices in the distance. That must have been when we had summers !!!

The 1970s saw me visit Glenbank just to show my own daughters where I had spent so many very happy times, taking photographs of them at the entrance. Since the late 1980s to the present day I have passed along the Aberargie to Abernethy road several times each year on the way to visiting friends Leslie and Sheila McIntosh at Marylea. I always check to see what colour the woodwork is at Glenbank.

I can remember painting the upper reaches with papa holding the bottom of the ladder, light and dark grey. Aunt Joey became a school cook, working at Abernethy and other schools.

She had a flat above the Bank on Newburgh road. Aunt Jean was a district nurse all her working life. Both have died in recent years.

My memories of Glenbank, Glenfoot and Abernethy are so positive and happy that, all being well, my ashes will be scattered close to the witches cave.

TAY LANDSCAPE PARTNERSHIP EVENING





As advertised in the last Crier, the Community Council gave over the whole of its meeting on 21st June in the Masonic Hall to a presentation by Johanna Babbs and Catriona Davies, development officers for the Tay Landscape Partnership.

This was the last of the first round of community involvement meetings, and despite the hellish weather it was by far the best attended. Many thanks to all who came. The development team have also intimated that they wish to thank those who completed the online survey. All grist to the mill, and so forth.

The purpose of this first round of meetings was for the project team to describe the scope of the whole scheme, and to discover what local communities up and down the Tay estuary felt was important for their area, what improvements they would like to see, etc.. Johanna and Catriona began by outlining the different stages of the scheme, whose big event in 2013 will be a major Heritage Lottery Fund bid with the aim of putting into effect several 'projects, activities and events to inspire residents and visitors alike'.

Several development themes were given–among them conserving/restoring the built and natural heritage; improving access to and knowledge of the rivers Tay and Earn; encouraging more active involvement with the landscape, and so on. At this point a long-standing resident of the village asked how likely it was that Perth and Kinross Council Planning would approve any scheme we came up with, given how often local representations had been ignored in the past–not an unreasonable point. Well, it is worth mentioning here that P&K have councillors on the Tay Landscape Partnership Steering Committee, and are supporting the scheme—the P&K logo appears on the literature and the website: www.taylp.org, so there is perhaps reason to be cautiously optimistic.

The second part of the evening was spent in group discussions, which were lively and (we hope therefore) will prove to have been productive. This was after all the local community's chance to have its say. It seemed to me that the idea of developing path networks for walkers and cyclists along the shores of the Tay was a particularly popular topic on the night, while archaeology, local signage, community orchards and several others also had a good airing.

And initial feedback from all of the community consultations reveals (surprise!) that the vast majority of people want to know more about the area--and feel there is a lack of information on where to go and what to see. Most people would also like to see boat trips on the Tay (the so-called 'river-taxis'). So what now? The Tay LP has 4 working groups. By the time you read this, the group whose focus is 'Reconnecting with the Landscape' will have visited Abernethy to tour the village and surrounds to see the context for potential development. Such activities are ongoing up and down the estuary.

Next the development team intends to return to communities some time in the autumn to discuss feedback from the local consultations and also what looks to be feasible in terms of the lottery bid. Overall development plans should be more concrete by then, and once again we'll be able to give our tuppenceworth accordingly. Watch out for more publicity in advance of this second round of community meetings. Check also www.taylp.org

Finally, may I repeat that it was gratifying to see such a good turnout for what was officially a Community Council meeting; it would be great to see such numbers at the more normal meetings. (The next one, by the way, will be on Thursday, September 20th in the Pavilion at Powrie Park, 7.30 pm.)

Cheers folks - the community really appreciates your efforts.

There is however more work to do to improve our parks. Ambitious plans include upgrading the facilities at Powrie Park to include a zip slide, an all abilities swing and a larger car park. But there's a huge funding gap to close first.

Perth and Kinross Council who own both parks are supporting the project with some funding. But AEA estimates a further £80,000 is needed to meet the diverse needs of the community.

Kate continued, "Existing facilities are not meeting expectations. Most of the play equipment in Powrie and Williamson parks is 25 years old and no longer fit for purpose. The local population has grown dramatically over the past 10 years and this is placing increased pressure on our amenities. We need to do more than the basics to provide a stimulating outdoor play and recreation experience for everyone in our community".

Our next quest is for 400 tonnes of type 1 (aggregate) to build a car park behind the Pavilion. Yip, we're aiming for a mud free parking experience for the many users of the Pavilion.

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


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
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
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
