TOGETHER WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE

This year Abernethy and Dron and Arngask Parish Church will undertake a stewardship campaign. Some church folk may inwardly groan, and some folk outside the Church may wonder what the fuss is about.

Stewardship is something Christians do as part of their faith, like going to church or giving to charity. We do these things because of what we believe. Christians believe we are responsible for what we do with our money. On the one hand we should not waste money or use it for wrong purposes; on the other hand we have a duty to continue Jesus' work in the world today and that costs money. To say that the church is always asking for money is to say that there is still a lot of work to be done.

One of the mistakes to make with stewardship is to make it an occasional thing, usually when funds are low or when financial panic sets in. Desperation is not the best motivation. Nobody gets unfit or overweight suddenly - the best remedy is good diet and regular exercise. So stewardship should be a regular part of the life of the church. Crash diets do not work and neither does short term fund raising or occasional panic stewardship. So we undertake this campaign from a healthy, strong position. We are also acting with other local churches. There are number of benefits from this, such as publicity, and emphasising that stewardship is something we all do. Features of this campaign will be familiar leaflets, meetings, visits to our church members, theme sermons etc. The central focus is to bring folk together at gatherings to hear about the church's work and how we still make a difference and then to ask them to review their Christian giving. In the difficult times of the 'credit crunch' some people may genuinely have less to give or you may give more effectively by gift aid. You can consider your options. This is about giving money, without apology, but is also about bringing people together and rekindling interest and enthusiasm. I think every doctor would recommend sensible diet and healthy exercise for obvious health benefits. Collecting for Christian Aid Week requires planning, organisation and effort and it helps the world's poorest people. Stewardship requires planning, effort and determination but it too brings benefits.




KINGDOM DRAGHOUNDS

17 June 1943 - 2 November 2008

Things are slowly changing in Romania but there is still a great deal of desperate poverty and need. The charitable foundation that Katie volunteers with relies totally on donations to run their orphanage, transit homes and social projects. These help abandoned children, teenagers and adults to gain a dignified life. Having just returned from visiting her, I experienced at first hand how valuable their work is and have decided to organise another collection.

The things they really would like us to collect are:

Good second hand clothing - especially for school age children and young adults
Shoes (not high heels) Sheets and blankets Nappies
Washing Powder Toiletries Sports equipment
Foodstuffs - especially Rice, Oil, Pasta, Salt & Sugar

Of course if you have anything else that you wish to donate it will be gratefully accepted - goods will either be sent out to Romania or sold to raise funds to help support Katie and her work there. We also wish to donate money to the Blythswood charity who will be transporting the goods out to Marghita again for us.

Village Ponies

Many people, especially parents with buggies and children, walk down Station road to the park and go past the pony paddock.

They often stop to speak to the ponies so here is an introduction to them.

Charlie, the smallest, is a Shetland pony. This is a very hardy breed with an extremely thick coat that can find food in the hardest conditions. They can be bad tempered but Charlie is very sweet natured. His worst fault is nibbling pockets to see if they hide any treats. He has never been ridden as one of his feet is not quite right but he makes an excellent companion for the other ponies.

In summer you will see Caramac, Mac for short who is a native pony angel. He is very careful with children who are learning to ride but he has taken Megan, 13, on a 12 mile Endurance Ride and over a Cross Country Course. She was very sad to out grow him. His worst fault is that he loves hay and will spend all day in the shelter eating non-stop. He spends his winters earning his living at Over Dalkeith Riding Stables, Rumbling Bridge, where he is very popular

The Queen of the field is Arabelle, an Arab/Welsh mare. The Arab blood gives her beauty and stamina and the Welsh blood gives her toughness which have helped her become the Scottish Endurance Champion after she won the 160km/100miles over two days race at Scone in 2008. She also was part of the victorious Scottish team at the Home International Championships in Ireland in rainy August, 2008.

She will not compete internationally because of rules about weight. She competes successfully against much bigger horses because she has a small neat rider. Under International rules she would have to carry lead weights to bring saddle and rider up to 12 ½ stone which is too much to ask of her.

Instead she is training for the ultimate Endurance challenge of 160km/100miles in a day. In May, all being well, she will travel to The Dukeries near Sherwood Forest to attempt this.

The ponies get fed every day, more in winter, and always have hay in their shelter. The manure is lifted to keep the paddock clean and gardeners are very welcome to help themselves

In April the paddock gets a rest and is fertilized and seeded but don't worry; you will see the ponies back again in May .
