This is just a wee reminder to anyone booking the Williamson Hall for an event that one of the booking conditions is that the hall should be left as you find it. The hall committee try very hard to keep rental charges as low as possible. Our regular users are very supportive of this, as are most people who hire the hall for parties, etc. Unfortunately, there have been a few occasions in the past few months when people have not tidied up properly after their events. The hall can't afford to pay repeatedly for additional cleaning so we may have to look at charging deposits or increasing our hourly rate. It would be a pity if a small minority spoiled things for others so, as a reminder to anyone hiring the hall, please can you ensure the following before you lock up:-

Dishes should be washed, dried and put away. Lights and hot water should be switched off.

The heating control panel should be left at 'off' or 'auto' (as you found it).

Tables should be wiped and stored under the stage.

The hall floor should be swept.

All empty bottles should be taken away as the hall has no glass recycling facilities.

Renovation Works

The Williamson Hall is having a facelift! At the time of writing this renovation work is well underway, and by the time you read this it should hopefully be all completed. Thanks to the generosity of a number of organisations we have been able to:

- Install new wooden hardwood double glazed windows.
- Remodel the ladies toilets to include an accessible (disabled) toilet and a proper baby change unit.
- Install internal solid wall insulation to the main hall and cavity wall insulation to the kitchen and toilets / storerooms.
- Redecorate the main hall.

We know the hall was tired looking and in the winter months it could be cold for users despite the heating running at full. Last year we spent over £3000 on oil and electricity – that's over 25% of our annual running costs! The renovation works will address this and make the hall warmer and much more pleasant and accessible for the community. The hall should re-open towards the end of August and we hope to have an official re-opening event towards the end of September. Keep an eye out for details and come along and celebrate our improvements with us!

ABERNETHY BIG DIG! Tay SUMMER 2015 Partnership

Abernethy is of huge historic importance and the Tay Landscape Partnership team would love you to help uncover its past. The story begins with early prehistoric activity, then Iron Age and Roman, including the suggestion of a bridge of Roman boats across the Tay at the nearby fortress of Carpow. The area's key sites connect the warlords of the Iron Age, through Pictish kingship, to early Christianity and the origins of medieval society in the area: the hill-fort at Abernethy law, the Pictish stone and early medieval round tower, the early monastery and later priory. The Pictish Chronicle records that King Nechtan reigned from here in the 5th century, and links him to the foundation of a church at Abernethy, testified by an early dedication to St. Bridgid, and the subsequent Culdee monastery and Augustinian priory of 1272 AD.

We are looking for budding volunteers to help carry out a Big Dig in and around Abernethy. Have you got a garden that you would be happy to excavate a 1m x 1m trench, with the help of professional archaeologists? This project will allow a peek at what lies beneath your feet and secrets of history that are yet to be discovered! Training in archaeological techniques and recording will be given. We would love you, from

THE ISLANDS AT THE EDGE OF THE WORLD

If you were to create a bucket list of places to visit then St Kilda should be on that list.

Sometimes described as 'the islands at the edge of the world', the archipelago of St Kilda is located 50 miles west of Harris in the Outer Hebrides. Formed from the rim of an ancient volcano, it is the remotest part of the British Isles.

Our day on St Kilda was amazing. We set off from Leverburgh on Harris for a two and a half hours high-speed boat ride along with 10 other eager visitors plus two crew. For at least half the time there was no land in view in any direction. Then in the distance we could see a series of indistinct smudges on the horizon and finally we arrived at Hirta the main island.

Comprising four islands – Hirta, Soay, Boreray and Dun – as well as several sea stacks, St Kilda is truly spectacular. It is one of only 29 global locations to be awarded 'mixed' World Heritage Status in recognition of both its natural and cultural significance.

St Kilda was home to a community who survived the inhospitable conditions here for thousands of years before the final 36 people were evacuated in 1930. They had survived near famine as well as disease that was brought to the island by passing ships. It is said they had perfect teeth as there was no sugar in their diet.

We walked through the main street of the deserted township with its small crofts all looking out over the bay. Dotted all around the island are hundreds of cleits

The people of St Kilda were not really fishermen, as one might expect, as the seas were too treacherous. Instead they survived on seabirds – mainly gannets and fulmars which they caught and used for food. Nothing went to waste. The meat was dried, stored, and finally in the cold winter months it was eaten. The seabird oil provided fuel for lamps, and their feathers were used for bedding.

We had a few hours to explore and walk in the sunshine till a sea haar came down, and then we set off back via the other islands including Boreray and Stack Lee which were 200 foot cliffs coming sheer out of the water with thousands of puffin, gannet, kittewake, arctic tern and others covering every ledge and wheeling around in the sky. There are even 300 wild sheep on the vertical cliffs of Boreray but no one has farmed the island for 90 years.

Today, St Kilda is the most important seabird breeding centre in north-west Europe and also is home to an early warning military radar station. We were lucky to go on a calm day as often the cruise cannot take place because of the wild Altantic weather. Try and go one day – you won't be disappointed. **Keith Rose**

ABERNETHY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

There is a well known irreverent law that says that that within a day or two of submitting a Crier article something of significant interest comes to light but it misses the cut-off for publication. It was just so earlier in the year when the Community Council update suggested no further developments in relation to the Aberargie Distillery only to find two days later that a new application had been submitted for a larger complex. Some will have seen the application progress quickly and successfully through the planning process, as yet there is no indication of when the works are likely to commence.

Contradicting that law on this occasion comes the very significant news that the Binn Farm landfill is set to close at the end of September this year although the disposal of certain types of waste will continue until March of next year. Following closure, there will be an extended period for site restoration which involves containing and capping all exposed landfill materials, then finally landscaping of the site. The operator then has a duty to continue to monitor and maintain the site for a period of five years after completion of the restoration programme. For the many who have been blighted by the landfill smells this must be very welcome news, the Community Council is an active participant in the Binn Farm Community Forum so we will closely monitor how the closure and restoration programme progresses.

Parking in Abernethy, in particular around the Square, is a regular discussion topic at the Community Council meetings and something that elicits strong feelings. Getting the balance right between the needs and expectations of residents, visitors and service vehicles is extremely difficult and one that inevitably involves compromise or accommodation. PKC Councillors and Road Safety Officer have conjointly visited the Square and while they have their own views the Community Council would be very keen to hear from villagers about how we can make a difficult situation more workable. It is important that the village maintains a degree of control over any decision on parking otherwise there is a risk we finish up with tightly controlled parking bays and our roads swathed in yellow lines.

ABERNETHY IN WORLD WAR 1 1914

On the home front, soon after Britain went to war, we read in the People's Journal 22/8/14 of the formation of a local branch of the Red Cross Society, for the purpose of making warm garments for soldiers. Lead-ing ladies of Abernethy comprised the committee, with the Rev George Macdougall being treasurer and Mrs G K Smith the convener. The first fund raising event we hear of was a Christmas concert.

Another charity, the Young Women's Christian Association, doing similar work is reported in a PJ article of 9/1/15. "Mrs Moore secretary of the YWCA Abernethy, has received from Lady French (through her secretary) a grateful acknowledgement of work done by members of the association for soldiers at the front. The work consisted of socks, hosetops, belts, vests, helmets, mufflers, mitts, gloves etc.

Of all the press reports I have unearthed relating to wartime Abernethy, the following is the most detailed account of the experiences of an Abernethy soldier. It relates to the early stages of the war before the ghastly scale of the conflict became generally apparent. Up until this point there was hope that "it will all be over by Christmas": -

Abernethy Soldier's Exciting Experiences Germans' Brutal Conduct

Private Alexander Christie, of the 6th Dragoon Guards who belongs to Abernethy, has been invalided home from the front, having at Warnington received a shrapnel wound below the left shoulder blade, the bullet lying within four inches of the heart. Private Christie took part in the retreat from Mons and the subsequent advance of the Allies. In the course of an interview, he told of some exciting experiences.

"One day three of us were left behind by our squadron, who took our horses with them. The squadron was behind a small wood, when the German guns got the range and the shell fire was so heavy that we three who were scouting in the wood could not be recalled in time to accompany them. We remained some time in the wood, sheltering ourselves behind trees, until the firing ceased, the enemy having meanwhile been attracted by our trenches. We got to the edge of the wood, and found the Germans only about 300 yards away.

A mangold field lay between us and the rest of the hill over which our squadron had disappeared. We ran into this field 100 yards and flopped down to recover our breath, the enemy's bullets whizzing past us to the right and left. Again we got to our feet and ran, and againr ested in the drills, not one of us being touched by the bullets, though there was nothing between us and the enemy. In this way we got through the field and over the hill to safety, and on to the village where our squadron was stationed."

After telling of the Aisne, he said: - "we pushed on to Warnington, where we had another hard fight, and found houses with bodies of old men. women and children in them. Ten old men were suspected by the Germans of being spies. The Germans made them dig their own graves and kneel down beside them and then the brutal soldiers shot them. On the way north we found that the Germans in their retreat had wrought as much destruction as they possibly could. Practically every house of any consequence had been entered and ransacked, and the pictures, ornaments, furniture &c smashed. While in the trenches at Warnington we were under very heavy shell fire. I got my wound at Warington on 21st October. At the time I got my wound my third horse since the beginning of the war was also wounded, being shot through the neck." People's Journal 5/12/14 page 11

It would be interesting to hear from our readers if anyone knows what happened to Private Christie in later life. Indeed anecdotes relating to the later life of Abernethy servicemen who survived the War would make a useful addition to the information files on the War which we are compiling in the Museum of Abernethy. TAY LANDSCAPE PARTNERSHIP

On Thursday 26 June Janet Paton, Alistair Robinson and I represented the Museum of Abernethy at the official launch of the Tayside Landscape Partnership (Tay LP) hosted by Castle Huntly.

During the evening we had an opportunity to meet the Tay LP staff, and were provided with an update on the 28 projects that the Tay LP will deliver over the next 4 years. The reception brought together 50 people from communities between Longforgan and Abernethy under one roof to celebrate the unique heritage which unites the Tay and Earn Estuaries. Shirley Paterson, the Tay LP's Manager, explained: "We are often not aware of the history and wildlife that connects and gives character to our towns and villages around the Tay. By inviting all those involved in the Partnership and allowing them to meet each other we hope to share The Tay Estuary story, demonstrating its uniqueness, deepening our understanding of past land use and enhancing our future experiences".

Following Shirley's presentation we were treated to a buffet prepared by the Castle Huntly team. The event was being hosted by Castle Huntly, as it is a recipient of the Tay LP's workshops and training. Sharanne Findlay, Governor at Castle Huntly explained: "This is a great opportunity for those in Castle Huntly to work hand in hand with the local community, giving something back. It also helps develop further skills that increase an individual's chance of employment on release from custody. There are obvious benefits for everyone involved and I am delighted that HMP Castle Huntly is involved in this inspiring partnership".

Over the past couple of years there have been articles in the Crier about Abernethy's involvement in the Tay LP, however now that the project is officially launched it may be useful to refresh memories about what is involved. The Tay LP is led by Perth & Kinross Heritage Trust and Perth & Kinross Countryside Trust, within a wider partnership including the Gannochy Trust and Perth & Kinross Council. In July 2013 the Heritage Lottery Fund announced an award of £1.43 million towards the Tay LP which will help to deliver a suite of 28 projects with a total value of around £2.6 million. A Scheme Manager, three Project Officers and a Volunteer Co-ordinator have been appointed to deliver the Tay LP which will run for four years from March 2014-February 2018. Angus Macintyre and I represent the Museum of

Abernethy on the Steering Committee, which consists of representatives from all the communities involved in the Tay LP.

Two of the 28 projects are specific to Abernethy: Ancient Abernethy: The aim is to enhance and promote the unique historic character of the village through focussing on key historic features in the village and its environs: the Roman remains at Carpow; the facades of the buildings within the Conservation Area; and the historic churchyard. There will be training for volunteers in geophysical survey and excavation techniques, and sites in and around the village will be investigated to find out more about the development of the settlement and Roman activity in the area, including the story of the "bridge of boats" across the Tay. The plan is to carry out a "Big Dig" at Carpow (dependent on landowner permission) in the summer months over the next three years. Owners of properties in the Abernethy Conservation Area will be offered grants for environmental improvements to enhance the historic character of the village, and work will be carried out to enhance the condition and appearance of the churchyard.

The Story of Abernethy: The overall objective of this project is to improve the "visitor offer" at Abernethy by enhancing the Museum displays and linking these with other heritage sites through well-planned interpretation. The upgrading of existing displays will include the provision of a professionally designed introductory panel and lighting for the Pictish stones. Our salmon coble "Emma" has already been repaired and restored with funding from the Tay LP, and further enhancement of the garden gallery is planned. An oral history hub is being established in the Museum, along with a broader range of resources and activities to appeal to a wide range of people; school groups, families, young people, lifelong learners and tourists.

As both these Abernethy projects develop there will be community events to showcase developments and encourage more people to discover the historical importance of the village and its place in the Tay LP landscape. Further information on these events, and on opportunities to get involved in the projects, will be highlighted in future editions of the Crier. 
