As you may have read in the last edition of the Crier I took part in a sponsored charity cycle ride from Inverness to Portsmouth during September. The event was organised by some colleagues of mine at SSE and was in support of Children's Hospices UK, so the route took us via several of the firm's offices and depots plus five of the Hospices.

Day 1, Inverness to Pitlochry (91 miles). As expected the weather was pretty mixed, wet to start with but a following wind. We'd all done that sort of distance in training but the challenge was going to be getting up the next day and doing it again - and again! Day 2 Pitlochry to New Lanark (117 miles) Some of the team visited Rachel House in Kinross. A long and tough day - I'll never cycle through Airdrie in the rush hour again!

Day 3 New Lanark to Stranraer (101 miles) Wind made the first half hard but lovely weather over the hills in the south of Scotland. Ferry to Belfast that night.

Day 4 Belfast to Dublin (120 miles) Weather was dreadful, pouring rain, wind against, 5 degrees - and the guy who prepared the route got it wrong - everyone ended up having to be picked up in the van eventually! On the way to the hotel in Dublin we stopped to ask a guy directions. His reply (genuinely!) was 'It's up that road, then it's either to the left, or the right!'

Day 5 Much needed rest day in Dublin. Overnight ferry to Liverpool, wakened at 4:15 am!
Day 6 Warrington to somewhere in the midlands (100 miles) I'll be honest, I'm not totally sure where we were at the end of this leg - somewhere near Birmingham!

Day 7 Midlands to Cardiff (92 miles) This was a lovely bit - Shropshire and Herefordshire are really nice, and we had warm sunshine!

Day 8 Cardiff to Swindon (80 miles) My group visited Ty Hafan, a hospice near Cardiff, before I set offwe had a team photo in front of a banner the children had made for us, and Nathan, who is cared for at the hospice, was the star of the show.

Day 9 Swindon to Basingstoke (70 miles) Both these towns were included because we have offices there - this gave us a chance to raise lots more money but to be honest, I'm in no hurry to go back to either place! Final Day Basingstoke to Portsmouth via Naomi House (65 miles) My second visit to a working hospice. As a parent your first thought is how lucky you are that you don't need to use Hospices. Th atmosphere in the Hospices is incredibly positive however, despite the fact that the children, their parents and siblings are living with terminal illness.

We received a fantastic reception at our main office in the south. I was absolutely exhausted by the end but our final fundraising total of over £150,000 cheered me up no end! MUSEUM OF ABERNETHY



In its tenth year of operation the Museum of Abernethy has had another successful season. We have had more group visits than usual, some of them combined with a guided walk around the village. Another example of "outreach" was our outdoor display on Gala Day in the Powrie Park, looking back on fifty years of the gala.

We are now looking for new ideas for future displays. Having covered the main work-related aspects of parish life, such as farming, salmon-fishing, weaving and clothing manufacture, shops, trades and businesses, our attention has recently turned to leisure-type topics. In 2008 we featured various sports played locally. The most recent venture was "100 Years of the Girl Guides". Over time we hope to cover several other clubs and societies, either as displays or in album format.

Next year the main theme is "Entertainment". Before the age of television and computers, entertainment was much more locally based and of a do-it-yourself nature. Hopefully we will be able to show that in the pre-electronic era people did have fun and were no less happy than present-day devotees of TV soap operas and video games. Abernethy had thriving drama and choral groups which staged many concerts and local productions. We have some photos of these and would love to have more, together with anecdotes and other ephemera - in fact anything that builds up a picture of how local people were entertained in the past century, or even earlier.

The SWRI has been active in the village for over 80 years and indeed has staged its fair share of concerts and entertainments. We intend to do a special section on this group, which must have a longer history than almost any other local club or society. If you are having difficulty getting through to the Citizen's Advice Bureau Advice Line you could try the new Tayside Advice Project.

This offers an e-mail advice service at advice.tayside@casonline.org.uk You give as much information as possible and say how you would like a reply e-mail, telephone or a written reply. You should hear within 5 working days.

There is also a telephone helpline at 0845 296 1010. The opening hours are; Tuesday 8am-10am, Wednesday 4pm-5pm, Thursday 2pm-4.30pm, Friday 8am-10am, last Saturday of each month10am-noon.

The difference between this and the normal helpline (01738 624301, weekdays, 10am-3.45pm) is that if you call out of hours or the line is busy you can leave a message and the adviser will contact you on the next working day.

As with the main bureau there is general information on a wide range of issues with specialist help for benefits, employment, housing or debt issues. Representation at court or tribunal may be available but will be offered on a case by case basis.

THE 65th ANNIVERSARY

I was fortunate to be stationed in Hampshire when the Victory Parade took place in London in June 1946 following the end of World War 2. I managed to book a room at a YMCA hostel in a fairly central location just off the Strand which enabled me to attend this spectacular event. My nephew recently discovered a letter which I had written to my late sister describing the event. The letter ran for 16 pages, 12 of which were devoted to the parade. Here are some edited highlights.

"I got into town about 9.20pm and after dumping my kit at the hostel I decided to have a stroll around and see all the decorations. I headed for the Mall and it was pretty crowded. All the available space was occupied and they had all come prepared with flasks, cases with grub and travelling rugs. Some sailors had their hammocks strung between the trees. I was thankful that I had a bed to go to when I saw them settling down for the night. The din was deafening with rattles, squeakers, anything that could make a noise. The racketeers were there to, selling flashy programmes at ridiculous prices and lemonade at 6d per glass and weak as water.

Next morning I met my pal at Charing Cross at 7am and after a bit of shoving we got a good place about 5 back at St. Martins in the Fields. After half-an-hour they were twenty deep behind us and we were being squashed a bit with 2 hours wait in front of us. We fought our way out and started to breathe again and that Betty was the victory parade! Don't you believe it. We went right round the route until we found a quiet part in Oxford Street where they were only about 4 deep. By this time we had about half-an-hour to wait which soon passed and then the trumpets were heralding the arrival of the Royal Family. The King, Queen and two Princesses were there with the household cavalry escort. The horses are wonderfully trained.

After that came the parade and never have I seen so many different uniforms and types together. The Yanks were first then came all the allies and colonial troops. I can't possibly describe them all. There were five pipe bands, the Indians, the Irish, the ATS, the RAF and last but not least the combined bands of the Scottish Regiments led by three drum majors, one being the drum major of our sister regiment the 10th Black Watch with whom I did my training at Lockerbie. A few of the pipers and drummers I recognised. They were the only band who played when passing us and if they hadn't it would have been a flop as far as I was concerned.

The one event I really wanted to see was the massed pipers in the Mall but we couldn't get near the place for crowds. The fly past followed the parade and then the rain came. We queued up to get into a news cinema, many had the same idea. When we emerged it was still raining so we returned to the hostel for some food and a much needed change of socks.

We then headed for the south side of the Thames to see the water pageant. We got a lovely position opposite the Houses of Parliament directly in front of the three set pieces of the King, Queen and Princesses. The display started with the fireboats throwing out illuminated jets in all directions in all colours of the rainbow. The Royal Family arrived and the searchlights dipped in salute. Then followed the most fantastic fireworks display. When the rockets burst they filled the sky with green, gold, purple and silver stars. Each fresh burst brought bigger gasps from the crowds. The set pieces were lit and the outline of the King, Queen and the Princess Elizabeth in lights lasted for several minutes. All the prominent buildings were illuminated in various colours and the fountains in Trafalgar Square were also illuminated, in red, white and blue. The loveliest sight of all however was the view of Buckingham Palace from the Mall.

It was floodlit in purple and it really was a sight worth seeing with the Victoria memorial in front and two light blue searchlights forming a V above it against the dark blue of the sky. I could write many more pages and still not cover everything but I don't think I have done too badly.

Reading the letter again, which I had completely forgotten about, after all these years brought back so many memories of a day which will live forever in my memory.

A LUXURIOUS DESSERT



Sticky Toffee Roulade with Butterscotch Sauce

Prep time 15 mins Cooking time 30 mins

2 tablespoons of caster sugar (for rolling the roulade)
160g of seeded dates
180ml of boiling water
1 teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda
50g of butter, diced
150g soft brown sugar
2 eggs
110g self raising flour
300ml of double or whipping cream

For the Butterscotch Sauce

100g of soft brown sugar 160ml of double cream 100g of butter, diced.

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C/Gas Mark 4-5. Grease a 25cm x 30cm swiss roll pan; line base and short sides with baking paper, bring paper 5cm above the edges of the pan. Place a piece the same size onto a large board or onto the work surface (out of the way) and sprinkle evenly with the caster sugar.
- 2. Combine dates, water and bicarb of soda in a food processor. Place the lid on allow to stand for 5 minutes. After this time has elapsed, add the butter and brown sugar; process until almost smooth. Then add eggs and flour; process until just combined.

- Do not overwork the mixture at this stage as it will start to stretch the gluten in the flour and will toughen the cake. Pour into the prepared pan, smooth out and bake in the pre heated oven for 15 mins.
- 3. Whilst the roulade is cooking, make your sauce. Combine all the ingredients in small saucepan. Over a low heat allow the sugar to dissolve and then bring to the boil. Boil for a couple of minutes. The more you boil this the more it will thicken.
- 4. Turn cake onto the prepared sugared paper and peel away the baking paper. Cut any crisp and raged edges off with a serrated knife.
- 5. Cover with a damp tea towel until you are ready to roll.
- 6. Whilst allowing the roulade to cool, whisk the cream until firm peaks. Once the sauce is cool, stir in a tablespoon into the cream, spread the cream over the surface of the roulade, allowing a cm of cake at each edge. Start to roll the cake from the long side, working quickly and confidently, roll the cake using the paper as a guide. Roll tightly and make sure the flap of the roulade is always underneath.
- 7. Serve the roulade with more of the sauce drizzled over it.

Welcome to a regular new feature in the Village Crier, the Police Box. This will endeavour to provide you with the latest information relating to crime in the local area. It will also offer crime prevention advice and try to make you aware of any upcoming initiatives being run by Tayside Police.

RESTUCTURE

In May 2010 a major restructuring took place within Tayside Police at which time the Auchterarder, Bridge of Earn, Crieff and Kinross Police stations were all amalgamated into one area known as the South Section.

The Inspector in charge of this section is Yvonne McGregor who will be assisted by two Community Sergeants, Sandra Williams based from Kinross with responsibility for Community Policing in the Bridge of Earn and Kinross areas; and David Pettigrew based from Crieff who has responsibility for the Auchterarder and Crieff areas. There are eight Community Officers who all have their own geographical areas.

Constable Euan Mitchell is the Community Officer for the Abernethy/Bridge of Earn area.

Euan joined Tayside Police in 2007 and has worked in both the Perth and Kinross sections until taking over his new Community Officer posting in May. He is keen to liaise with the local community in an effort to identify and resolve neighbourhood complaints, anti-social behaviour and other issues causing concern locally.

MOBILE COMMUNITY OFFICE

To allow Euan to further engage with the local community, Tayside Police now has a Mobile Community Office which will be available in Abernethy on a monthly basis. The Mobile Office service will initially be on a trial basis to gauge its likely use, although it is hoped it will be well used. Should demand be there, it may be possible to extend the hours, make more frequent visits and even to widen also the service to cover the more rural areas. Hopefully this will make your local Community Officer more accessible and to provide public reassurance.

ASSISTANCE FROM THE PUBLIC

We would urge members of the public to inform us of all incidents when they happen. Very often people are reluctant to "get involved" because of preconceived ideas that they will be targeted and anticipate reprisals. However this very rarely, if ever, happens and is viewed very seriously by the courts if it does. In any case, although it is more help to the police for witnesses to give their details, an anonymous call to report a crime being committed or to report suspicious behaviour or noises is better than no call at all. When deciding whether to call the police to report incidents such as those described above, we would ask members of the public to consider how they would feel if they were the victim, and that somebody who had been in a position to help them did nothing.

We are frequently told about incidents days or even weeks after they happen, usually when the person reporting happens to meet one of us in the street or at a meeting and we are asked "what are you doing about youths hanging about our street" or similar "it's happening every night". We then find that the incident described has either happened several days before or has been going on for several weeks. It considerably lessens the possibility to effectively deal with an incident if we are not informed at the time and makes it impossible if we do not know at all.

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
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
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
